

# **Chairman's Letter**


#### **Dear Members**

#### **Lecture Review**

# Pre-Raphaelites with Dr Alexandra Loske

Last October EAC and members attended a lecture on the *Pre-Raphaelites* given by Dr Alexandra Loske, a published Art Historian and Curator at Brighton Pavilion. This proved to be a popular subject with every seat sold in the auditorium. Dr Loske had lectured previously at the Towner and was well received by the audience, many of whom remembered her previous talks on 'Colour' and on the Impressionists. Listening to comments while waiting in my seat I sensed the enthusiasm and anticipation of the audience, and felt I was in for a good experience.

I was not disappointed. We were introduced to the PRB - the Pre Raphaelite-Brotherhood consisting initially of Holman Hunt, Millais and Rossetti and looked at their major works.... Ophelia, Mariana, the Hireling Shepherd, The Annunciation, Proserpine and many others. The paintings were described in depth and details pointed out which made the images far more meaningful. It was interesting to examine the symbolism in the paintings, so easily overlooked. It was also interesting to note that, though popular today, many of their works were highly criticised at the time as not befitting Victorian society. Possibly, the artists' lifestyle at the time was also less acceptable to the establishment?

Dr Loske went on to look at the impact of the initial brotherhood and followed up with artists such as Lord Leighton, Waterhouse, Whistler and Morris who had all been influenced in some way, particularly in their depictions of beauty and accurate portrayal of nature.

The session ended with lively Q&A and I left the lecture with far more knowledge than when I arrived, and more appreciative of the legacy left by the Pre-Raphaelites to the Art world thanks to the expertise and entertaining delivery by Dr Alexander Loske.

# Unwrapping the Secret Life of Reliquaries

with Dr Helen Rufus-Ward

The word 'relic' comes from Latin Reliquiae meaning 'left behind'. All reliquaries are hollow to hold a sacred relic such as the bone of a saint or a piece of the true cross. This lecture will examine many exquisitely crafted reliquaries – in all shapes and sizes – many wrought in precious materials such as gold, silver, ivory and enamel and some mass produced in base metal alloys. Also, to be revealed is the sensory way such reliquaries were engaged with and the cult of saints that underpinned their talismanic and apotropaic power. Concludes with an opportunity to handle a genuine 12th century reliquary!

# Painter of Modern Life: Walter Sickert and the Camden Town Group with Peter Scott

**Friday 8 February** 2.30pm - 4.30pm



The Camden Town Group of painters, led by Walter Sickert, chronicled the changes in British society, and particularly in London, in the years before and during the First World War. They saw themselves as 'painters of modern life' depicting many of the challenges to the values of the nineteenth century. They painted portraits of working-class subjects and created images of women as explicit as anything being produced in Europe at the time. These works are recognisable for their use of bold anti-naturalistic colouring and noted for their striking images of the music hall which provide an invaluable record of the leisure pursuits of the Edwardian age. The Camden town Group had only a brief life, holding just three exhibitions, in June and December 1911 and December 1912, although the individual members worked on.

**Peter Scott** is a lecturer and guide at Tate Britain, Tate Modern, Dulwich Picture Gallery and Bristol Art Gallery. He also lectures for the Art Fund, Arts Societies and the National Trust and is a tutor for the WEA.

Yehudi Menuhin was arguably the most famous classical musician of the twentieth century. He was certainly the highest paid. His upbringing was unusual and as a legend in his own lifetime it is hardly surprising that many myths developed about him throughout his long career. A latter-day Paganini, his extraordinary charm and charisma kept him at the forefront of the musical world for seventy years. Nicolas Chisholm charts the rise and rise of this extraordinary musician and the influence he still has on the musical world today.

Before his retirement Nicolas Chisholm was Headmaster of The Yehudi Menuhin School for twenty-two years and worked closely with Yehudi Menuhin for the first eleven of them.

We are delighted to be showing a fine recording of Rossini's popular opera the Barber of Seville. The premier was on February 20th 1816 in the Teatro Argentina in Rome, conducted by Rossini. The Barber is the first of the Beaumarchais trilogy of Figaro comedies. This recording has a superb cast with Cecilia Bartoli singing the part of Rosina, one of today's finest singers for this dazzling coloratura music.

The opera is a typical operatic story of intrigue and plots. Old doctor Bartolo, sung by Robert Lloyd, wants to marry the wealthy Rosina who is his ward, so does Almaviva, a Spanish Grandee (sung by David Kuebler). (For opera historians these are the Count and Countess in Mozart's Marriage of Figaro). Almaviva enlists the help of the Barber, Figaro sung by Gino Quilico and so begins a comic musical masterpiece. This sparkling and witty opera is brimming with famous arias. 'Largo al Factotum' is considered to be unequalled as a bravura aria, and figures among the best-known baritone solos in opera.

# Cy Twombly: Painter, Sculptor and photographer with John Perrin Friday 12 April 2.30pm - 4.30pm Towner, Carlisle Road Easthourne

Cy Twombly was one of the most influential artists of the 20th century - his canvases were often inspired by ancient myths or classical European literature and include painting, drawing, writing, poetry and images. In the 1950s at the time when abstract painting dominated the New York art scene he left America to live in Rome.

Cy Twombly's deeply sophisticated work is an expression of the language of memory and desire. His paintings are delicate, unrestrained and spontaneous; his work is created by an 'Encounter' with the canvas.

John Perrin will explore his work through high quality digital slides of his major paintings including his early work, several series of paintings including 'Quattro Stagioni' (four seasons) and some of his key sculptures.

**John Perrin MA** is a very experienced lecturer who runs regular WEA courses throughout Sussex on the Appreciation of Modern Art.


