Our Cover Picture

We are very privileged to have been given permission to reproduce 'The Evening Train' for our cover. Oil on board, this was painted by Harold Mockford in 1999 when he had moved to Newhaven.

This painting was one of 70 shown during the Harold Mockford retrospective exhibition at Towner this summer. The exhibition took place this year, his 80th birthday year, and was a revelation to all who went to see it. Friends who had not previously known his work visited the exhibition up to three times; 'a major artist' was the consensus. Amazingly, Harold Mockford initially planned to train as a dental technician, with art as a hobby.

After joining the Eastbourne Group of Artists Mockford's talent was spotted by William Gear, Curator of the Towner Gallery from 1958 - 64. Towner's first purchase in 1958 of the painting entitled 'Eastbourne' was controversial. The Gallery now has its own collection of 14 Harold Mockfords, 'When the Lights Come On' receiving the highest number of votes for the People's Choice exhibition on the reopening of the Gallery in 2009 in Devonshire Park.

Don't miss: the new Towner publication on Harold Mockford. This was released on November 17 and contains an illustrative

catalogue of the exhibition with colour images, as well as information on Mockford's relationship with Towner by Julie Brown, Assistant Curator. Sara Cooper, curator of the exhibition, has written about the artist's life and art, and Matthew Rowe, Artistic Director, has written an essay on his conversation with the artist.

Born in London in 1992, Mishka was described as "an extraordinarily gifted young artist and a recitalist of distinction. Audiences have been both enchanted by her performance and that a young player should bring such maturity and depth to her interpretations"



She is the youngest pupil ever admitted to the Purcell School; aged six on a full scholarship where she was a pupil of LLana Davids. She is now a postgraduate scholar and student of Joan Havill at the Guildall School of Music. Previously Mishka studied with Imogen Cooper for five years as her only student, and has studied periodically with Alfred Brendal.

She now has a busy performing schedule in major world venues.

His work has been called brash and shallow, hers dismissed as fussy and spinsterish. These assessments are not really fair to either artist, and this talk takes a careful look at their lives, in parallel, up to the point of Gwen's death in 1939. At that time Gwen had no public reputation whatsoever, whereas her brother was enjoying enormous professional and critical success.

By the time he died, however, the positions had been reversed, and the talk will consider the reasons why.

Linda is a distinguished art historian, with a special interest in British art, and art of the twentieth century. She is an accredited NADFAS lecturer, as well as an experienced gallery guide at Tate Britain and Tate Modern.

Andy has established himself as a cornet player of national repute and he will be joined by Keith Nichols (piano), Malcolm Sked (bass) and the inimitable Thomas "Spats" Langham on banjo and guitar.

Keith has appeared on a number of Friends' jazz events over the years. His reputation as a leading exponent of classic jazz piano has spread throughout Europe and he has made numerous recordings. Spats Langham is a top musician and entertainer, his mellow crooning is reminiscent of Al Bowlly. He has toured extensively, including two trips to Australia.

Gareth Thomas: An Afternoon with John Betjeman Thursday 28 March, 3.00pm Birley Centre Admission £12 (Members £10)

John Betjeman, self-styled 'poet and hack', was born in 1906. With an abiding passion for Victorian architecture, he was a founding member of the Victorian Society, and led the fight to preserve St.Pancras Station among other iconic buildings and churches. He was knighted in 1969, and followed Cecil Day Lewis as Poet Laureate in 1972, a post he held until his death in 1984. Gareth Thomas will read poems that illustrate memorable moments in

Gareth Thomas is immediately recognisable from his numerous films and stage appearances over many years. His range is impressively varied, from King Lear to Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, Cassio in Othello to Sir Toby Belch, Bergerac, Taggart, Sherlock Holmes, and How Green was my Valley. As a regular on television, he is maybe best remembered for playing Blake in "Blakes 7". Other major parts include Sutherlands Law, By the Sword Divided, London's Burning, Heartbeat, Midsomer Murders.

His numerous Shakesperean roles include, Twelth Night, Henry IVth, Henry Vth, and King Lear. Other plays include The Crucible, Equus and Deja Vu, fellow thespians being John Gielgud, Alec Guiness, and Michael Gambon amongst others.

Hepworth's sculptures between 1930 and 1975. We learn how her work communicates ideas and influences such as her visit to Brancusi's studio in Paris in 1932, her visit



to Greece in 1954 and her inspiration from nature and the Cornish seascape; how her work achieves her aims in terms of abstraction and purity of form.

Nicholson's paintings between 1924 and 1969. John Perrin will describe

how his work developed from his influences such as Alfred Wallis, Piet Mondrian, Cubism and the natural Cornish landscape.



Friday 22 February Pipers and Tune with Janet Canetty-Clarke



Since 1897, when Sir Benjamin Stone established the National Photographic Record Association (NPRA), photographers have had a fascination with the rites and rituals of Britain. This exhibition explores the complimentary relationship between photography and folklore practice – featuring

contributions from Faye Claridge, Matthew Cowan, Doc Rowe, Sir Benjamin Stone Collection, Homer Sykes, Brian Shuel, Sara Hannant, Tom Chick, David Ellison, Henry Bourne and Flickr.

This Towner Collection display takes you on a journey through the winter land-scape – from the forest to the ice cap. The exhibition features iconic works such as Eric Ravilious's Downs in Winter and The Forked Forest Path by Olafur Eliasson, whose artwork The Weather Project remains one of Tate's most popular Turbine Hall installations.

Towner acquired The Forked Forest Path through the Contemporary Art Society in 2004 and this is the first time this striking forest installation has been shown in our new building. The display also features

works by Christopher Wood, William Gear, Henri Gaudier-Brzeska, Duncan Grant, Joachim Koester, Edward Stott and more.

We are very pleased that Kelly Richardson, the artist behind our upcoming solo exhibition Legion, has lent a series of photographs to the show. Bon hiver is a traditional French greeting. Directly translated, it means "good winter". It is often used on the first day of snowfall in the year.

Kelly Richardson is known for her stunning large scale video installations of hyper-real landscapes. Combining the real and the imagined to powerful effect, she starts by filming real landscapes and then uses digital technology to distort them until they appear unfamiliar and foreboding.
